

A New Thing

Steps for Reopening

- 1. Communion will be done with individual packets of bread and juice. And yes, I also didn't know that you could buy these before COVID-19. The packets come with a cup of grape juice wrapped in plastic with a communion wafer on top, also wrapped in plastic. They will be set on the table in the narthex to be picked up when entering the sanctuary. This will prevent spreading COVID (or other germs for that matter!) in the passing of the communion plates. If you have questions, Session members have already used these individual packets for communion at a recent Session meeting. 2. The offering will be taken through plates set out in the back. You can still drop your offering through the week or mail it in. Similar to communion, this will prevent transmission through passing the offering plates.
- 3. We ask all to wear masks for worship. If you do not have one, masks will be available in the narthex.
- 4. The microphone will not be passed during the prayer time. I will summarize each praise and request when it is offered for those who unable hear without amplification.
- 5. Bulletins will be on the back table along with copies of the Sandpiper and Our Daily Bread.
- 6. During summer months, Middle Sandy has traditionally switched to a 9:30 worship time with no Sunday school or choir. When we return, this will be the time and set up for this summer as well.
- 7. Please sit every other pew to ensure proper social distancing. Every other pew will be roped off to assist with this.
- 8. Additional sanitizing has been ongoing since the shutdown, and this will be done in the sanctuary, restrooms, and other areas on

a weekly basis when we return for worship.

9. Following the service, rows will be dismissed back to front. Please wait after the service to be dismissed according. If you desire to fellowship, please do so outside.

10. The service will continue to be abbreviated. As social distancing and other steps are lifted as the pandemic slows down, we will switch to our usual worship format.

11. Finally, we hope to continue live streaming worship and are currently looking into options, since the current streaming setup is not conducive for in-person worship.

- 7. Projects & Other Opportunities at Church Your staff and elders are hard at work throughout this crisis. We are using this as an opportunity to get additional cleaning and other projects done, as is possible with only a small handful of people (1-4) at the church at a time.
